Many capable and articulate adults stammer when they try to define drum corps. "It's, ahh, well ... it's sort of like ... marching band ... but, ummm, only way better ..." Some call it extreme marching band; others compare it to professional marching band; one director even refers to it as a cross between a Broadway musical and a marching band show.

It's true, drum corps does very much resemble marching band; there are, of course, certain key differences. But before we talk about what drum corps isn't, let's talk about what it is.

Modern junior drum and bugle corps ("drum corps" for short) are independent youth organizations made up of up to 135 14- to 22-year-olds who spend the summer rehearsing and performing an 11-minute show in which they play a variety of horns or percussion instruments, or spin flags, rifles, sabres, and other implements, all while marching around a football field.

Now for those key differences. There are no woodwinds (clarinets, flutes, etc.) in drum corps, and a few of the brass instruments are constructed slightly differently from those you'd see on a local football field on a Friday night.

The intensity level is much higher in drum corps, and the difficulty level of the shows is much higher. Then, too, there's the commitment: Drum corps members spend three to four weeks in everyday rehearsals and eight weeks on tour, doing nothing but drum corps, day in and day out. They even pay for this privilege! Members generally have to pass an often-rigorous and selective audition process to be admitted to membership to a specific corps. And finally -- and importantly -- drum corps are, with a few exceptions, not affiliated with a school or university.

The corps that participated in this competition was: The Cavaliers, Santa Clara Vanguard, Carolina Crown, Spirit from JSU, Mandarins, The Magic, Pioneer and Revolution. The precision was amazing and the shows phenomenal. It was so much fun, we can't wait until next year!!!!

BASIC STUDY STRATEGIES

All parents want their child to be a great student and be successful in life. One of the best things you can do for your child is helping him/her establish good study habits early on. There are several things you can do to enable him/her to work well and become a strong student and subsequently an exceptional leader.

First, communicate to your child the importance of studying. Daily studying will commit information that he/she is learning in school to his/her long-term memory. Even if he/she doesn't have homework, encourage him/her to do some practice problems and read or re-read for his/her classes. A regular reading hour is also a good idea to get your child in the habit of keeping up on new information, either in school or in such areas as world affairs.

If you want your child to study regularly and effectively, it is important that he/she has a comfortable study area where he can accomplish this task. Find a nice, quiet area in their room or in some part of your house and set up a desk for your child. If he has a computer, place it on his desk so that he/she has access to research resources and writing programs. Be sure that the desk is stocked with paper and pens and any other study tools that he might need, so that he/she doesn't have to get up and find them while studying.

A good diet and a regular sleep schedule will also help your child succeed academically. But, ultimately, you can help your child become a great student by providing him with the right environment and encouraging a positive attitude toward learning.

Lastly, have your child teach you. This will build his/her confidence and in the end, you will both learn a lot.
